
Courage!

My journey is over; I enjoy time; The universe is my nest, Of eternal spring.




Yogi Shuddhananda Bharati typing his Poems on the typewriter in Pondicherry.

Presentation of Dr. Shuddhananda Bharati

11th May 1897 – 7th March 1990 The wise one to the cosmic age

Although more than 90 years old, in his school in the south of India, Kavi Yogi Maharishi (great divine visionary, wise poet), Dr.Shuddhananda Bharati worked like a young man of twenty. When he was asked his age, he answered: "My age is Courage!" The Yogi wrote several hundred works in English, French, Tamil, Hindi, Telugu and Sanskrit; five thousand songs, and fifteen hundred poems in French. The magnum opus of the man conscious of the presence of God in him, Bharata Shakti, (in 50,000 verses) described his ideal: only One Humanity living in communion with only One God in a transformed world! Bharata Shakti is a monumental and unique work. The Yogi depicts the essence of all the religions, of all the prophets and saints, all the approaches of Yoga and all the cultures on an allegorical fabric. It is a book for any age which all spiritual researchers and all nations should read and meditate on. His commitment is summarized in his book celebrating his life, Pilgrim Soul. The two poems mentioned in the opening express perfectly his ideal. His mantra, Aum Shuddha Shakti Aum, nourishes our souls and guides our steps toward the inner joy Ananda. It means: The light of Grace and power of the pure supreme Almighty bless us of peace, happiness and prosperity! Let the beauty and greatness of soul of Dr. Bharati Shuddhananda bloom and scent the entire Earth of its divine message and his spiritual and unifying benefactor!

Part I

Life sketch of Yogi Shuddhananda Bharati

1. Born Yogi

Saint Shuddhananda Bharati is known to the world today as a pure yogi, a divine personality who lives in God for the service of His creatures. The biographical encyclopaedia of the world speaks of him as follows:

"Yogi Sri Shuddhananda Bharati, Saint, Scholar, Poet and Spiritual Magnate of South India, born May 11, 1897, Sivaganga, Madras Presidency, South India; a born Yogi, lived in divine communion since childhood. Greatest living Tamil Poet. Easily versifies in English as well as French; author of several English and French poems. Has made deep study of English literature and all branches of modern science. Has written brilliant treatises on them, in addition to his various other literary works, which include epics, lyrics, melodramas, dramas, pastorals, novels, short stories, biographies, commentaries on illustrious works, essays, etc. Has so far written 200 books. An original epic of his, called *Bharata Shakti Maha Kavyam* (Tamil) in 50,000 lines of poetry is the magnum opus.

Began career as an educationist, conducted residential schools for the young, edited eight journals. Then took to rural reconstruction work; started schools, cottage industries, public benefactions, devotional concerts, yoga classes, etc. Has a practical knowledge of all religions and philosophies. Gave away all his income to public causes; one of the social and political workers in India now immersed in yogas".

2. Pure life

Swamiji's autobiography, A Pilgrim Soul, is a lamp of practical wisdom. We see in it how the Swamiji has been living in Yoga with the Divine and following the voice of Conscience from Truth to Truth, from Light to Light, tiding over the countless difficulties of life in this world. He has an intuitive genius. His heart is wide like the sky and his mind deep in meditation. He considers the heavencanopied universe as his home, humanity as his kith and kin, God as his Father and His Grace as his Mother. Even as a tender boy of seven years, he contemplated on the wide sky as the form of God and the sunrise as His emanation. He has realised God as the highest Purity and all creation as the manifestation of His Power so that he calls the Pure Almighty as Aum Shuddha Shakti, meaning Aum Hail Pure Almighty Grace. This mantra was inspired in him intuitively. His breath marches to its rhythm. He is attached to none and nothing except to the Pure Almighty Aum which has given him Light and leading. From A to Z, his life is evidence of the Divine Presence and possibility. He sees the world from within, with a psychic micro-telescope of intuition and knows things from direct perception. He keeps up what he calls the Gnostic Equilibrium by which the soul is in tune with the Supreme. He lives the purest life, takes the simplest natural diet and does the hardest labour for the uplift of humanity.

3. Inspired poet

Even as a little boy of seven he spurned wealth and luxury. His uncle placed before the boy his immense treasure with the tempting words: "Anandam, all these are yours; be my son." "I am the son of the pure Almighty Aum," said the boy. "All these treasures are His. Give them to the poor; that is the use of wealth." At that moment a beggar was crying in the street. Young Shuddhananda quickly picked up a few gold coins from the heaped treasure and ran crying: "This is for my brother there!"

The perturbed uncle plucked off the coins from the boy's hand, locked up his safe and reprimanded: "Impertinent! You speak to me like a yogi! Go away to your Pure Almighty!" That was a divine call indeed! The boy patiently went to the temple and surrendered himself to the Divine Power; so perfect was that surrender that the Grace possessed him and in a sudden fit of inspiration he lisped verses. From that day, poetry and songs flowed from his heart in perennial streams of ecstasy. Thousands of his early poems were put to fire by one of his envious relatives. The boy never dreamt that he would become a famous poet. He sang before the Divine Presence and tore away what he wrote. One day he was writing on the wall: "Seek ye the Divine Light alone; all else will break off and then vanish like bubbles." This drew the admiration of a wise scholar, who found out his genius and encouraged him to compose poems daily and preserve them for the future. He received English education and Vedic training, which gave him a comprehensive knowledge of India's heritage and culture.

4. Inner Wisdom

Shuddhananda took interest in seer-poets like Vyasa, Valmiki, Kalidasa, Sankara, Kamban, Valluvar, Tayumanar, Appar, Manickavachakar, Ramalingam, Nammalvar, Vemana, Thyagaraja, Milton, Shakespeare, Racine, Dante, Virgil and Homer. He became a linguist and a voracious reader of modern books and sciences. But he has risen beyond book-knowledge to the treasures of the inner wisdom and created a psychic university within himself. By self-identification with the soul of god-men and god-poets and by dint of hard tapasya (austerities) he has developed his knowledge and psychic powers to a great extent and he is able to pour out his soul's inspiration like torrents. His parents tried to yoke him in wedlock several times but he escaped all. In his sixteenth year he renounced home and took to intense self-culture and realisation. The name Shuddhananda Bharati (meaning Bliss in Purity) was given to him by a saint in his boyhood. Bharati (meaning wisdom) is the lineal honorific suffix of the monastic sect to which he belongs. His master initiated him in spirituality and yoga and after intense meditation and silence he attained God-consciousness in his eighteenth year. In his twentieth year he had started to write his magnum opus, the Bharata Shakti, which contains 50,000 lines.

5. Educator

Swamiji believes in self-help and economic independence. He is not a mere sky-gazer. He is very practical in his life. Early in life he maintained himself by teaching boys. He has been an educationist well esteemed by his colleagues and a scout master too. He joined the Teachers' Guild and fought for the amelioration of the teaching profession. He treated his students as his own brothers and devoted his heart and soul for their perfection. Besides teaching the class lessons, he trained them in social and national service. He taught them how to be healthy, resourceful, devoted to God and to humanity and how to be useful to the country. In short, he had followed the system of Gurukula education.

He did a good deal of rural uplift work. To raise the depressed, to remove the evils of caste and fanaticism, to liquidate illiteracy, to remove poverty, ignorance, social and political slavery, he did admirable service. His songs and speeches spurred people to action. He held Bhajans, religious concerts and spiritual classes.

As an outcome, many people left off meat eating, liquor, tobacco, evil habits and vain gossip. He conducted mass drills and scout camps. He gave his students mental, moral, aesthetic, physical, industrial and spiritual training. He taught them applied science also.

One day he was mixing chemicals to make match-sticks. A sudden explosion! His wrist was bleeding. He swooned. The fumes choked his breath. Friends began to be anxious about his life. Suddenly he rose up, controlling himself by yogic force and said: "God has warned me, I must fulfil my mission; yes, I must not delay, He calls me." From that moment, not a minute sparing, he steeped himself into his spiritual and poetic mission. It was after this accident that he began to write his *Bharata Shakti*.

6. Nationalist

Early in life, Shuddhananda was a staunch nationalist. His nationalism began with the Vandemataram movement launched by Tilak. Tilak and V. O. Chidambaram Pillai were his early heroes. He was then a revolutionary. His views were changed when he came close to Mahatma Gandhiji in 1917. He translated into action whatever Gandhiji said in his Young India. From Gandhiji at Tiruchirapalli in 1920 Shuddhananda received Kaddhar with his blessings and boldly took part in the Satyagraha meetings and also organised Congress volunteers. He bloomed into an evolutionary, spiritual socialist. Gandhiji appreciated his universal ideas. During the days of the Khilafat agitation, he lived in a mosque and practised Islam. He did regularly the five Namaz and observed Id and Ramzan. He studied the Al Ouoran under a moulvi and wrote the life and teachings of the Prophet Mohammed in verses which he read in the mosque every night. He thus won the respect and regard of Islamic friends. It must be noted that he also studied the *Bible* thoroughly and wrote the life and teachings of Jesus in verses while he was in a Christian institution.

Mahatmaji advised him to carry on constructive work. Accordingly, Swamiji toured the villages along with his volunteers and served the nation in word and deed as desired by Gandhiji.

7. Freedom Calls

His spiritual socialism frightened the school authorities. Swamiji encouraged his students to attend the national meetings and he took them one midnight to see Mahatmaji on his way to Tiruchi. As a result, the students were to be punished. Swamiji protested, saying: "I led the future citizens of my country to see the father of our nation. Me punish!" The head of the institution secretly punished the students. Swamiji placed on his table a laconic resignation. "Freedom calls; no more walls!" The students gave him a rousing farewell. "I leave the armchair-life to lead a life of yoga and service; from sacrifice to sacrifice I shall go until nothing shall be left in me except God," said he in reply to the farewell address. He did austerities for a few days on hills and river beds and then went to Devakottah where a national school was organised by one of his bosom friends. Here he span, wove, taught, trained young men, spread Khadhi, did humanitarian work, organised national meetings and devotional concerts. He found time to write science books from the science hall where he was put up. He held Hindi classes also and Yoga Siddhi groups. He was organising an institution to work out his own plans of national education when the call of the revolutionary hero, Sri V. V. S. Ayyar, came.

8. Gurukul

Mr. Ayyar, a scholar, patriot and savant, was a long time friend of Swamiji. He started a gurukul at Shermadevi and called Swamiji for his assistance. Swamiji attended the Rameshwaram conference and spoke there on the future of nationalism and the need for constructive works and the aims of the Gurukula education. He then went to the Bharadwaja Ashram – as the gurukula was called – to be the close companion of Mr. Ayyar to conduct the gurukul and also the *Bala Bharathi*, a new monthly. The friendship of Mr. Ayyar did him immense good. With him, he studied all the European and Oriental classics and wrote a number of inspiring poems and prose works. The tragic death of Ayyar cast a gloom on his life. He ran the institution and the monthly for a time and then set out to Viswa Yoga (Yoga for the Universal Good) and also to serve the country in all possible ways, that is, to be in tune with the Infinite Divine as one serves humanity.

9. Viswa Yoga

He edited the Samarasa Bodhini, a biweekly, for some months and then started an industrial ashram and a journal called Tozhil Kalvi (Industrial Education). He organised and directed rural services in several villages and worked out schools, sanatoriums, concerts, spinning and weaving crafts and held religious classes at night. He gave employment and food to the poor and reformed their lives. Many people abstained from drink and evil habits and joined his devotional concerts. Through songs he reformed the people and those songs are in book form today. He next edited a monthly called Nature (Iyarkai) to teach people how to live in tune with Mother Nature, a disease-free life. He presided over a number of rural reconstruction conferences and his presidential addresses are still read with emotion. He did humanitarian work and saved thousands of lives from being killed in the name of religion. He even fasted in some places to achieve his aim.

He then came in contact with Jain ascetics; mastered their literature and wrote the life and teachings of Mahavira during a ten-day fast. Then he reverted to Buddhism. He lived with some Bikshus, studied the *Dammapada*, Zen Buddhism and wrote the life and teachings of the Buddha in lucid verses. He was also connected with the Youth Movement started by T. L. Vasvani and taught to the students Hatha asana and Pranayama and the Brahmacharya cult for which a monthly was run.

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
